OCDC Mission



The Oregon Child Development Coalition (OCDC) is a private, non-profit corporation established in 1971 that operates early childhood education programs in the state of Oregon and serves over 4,000 children and families in its different programs, including:

- Migrant and Seasonal Head Start and Early Head Start (MSHS/EHS),
- Early Head Start Childcare Partnerships Region X (RX EHS CCP)
- Early Head Start Childcare
- Oregon Prenatal to Kindergarten (OPK)
- Preschool for All (PFA)
- Preschool Promise (PSP)
- Maternal, Infant, Early Childhood Home Visiting (MIECHV)



Mission: OCDC is dedicated to improving the lives of children and families by providing early childhood education, care and advocacy with unique and supportive services to enhance family growth and community success.



School Readiness: OCDC prepares children for school by focusing on early childhood care, education and teacher development, promotes economic opportunities for families and communities by providing services that support the workforce and, in turn, state and local economies, partners with the community by collaborating with dentists, doctors, educators, health care providers, emergency food care providers, school districts, employers and state and local service providers, and practices inclusiveness by welcoming all cultures and languages.



Wellness: At OCDC, we strive for a culture of well-being for all OCDC employees, partners, families and children. Equitable, inclusive, sustainable, and holistic well-being approaches are the foundation of our program. Empowering people and emphasizing well-being influences our agency's priorities, policies and procedures to ensure the achievement of the agency's mission. Through a trauma informed lens, we actively engage in reflective and responsive well-being practices, we demonstrate our shared values, establish and maintain trusting relationships, provide meaningful recognition and emotional support, ensure purposeful work, and promote work-life balance.



The Agency's Efforts to Prepare Children for Kindergarten

School Readiness Goals 2023-2024

OCDC has developed agency wide School Readiness Goals, which were revised in early 2023 using a three-step process. This process included reviewing and analyzing outcomes from all pertinent data sources, involving parents in giving input and feedback, and utilizing information obtained through ongoing relationships with local school district to align the school readiness goals with kindergarten expectations. These goals align with the Head Start Early Learning Outcomes Framework, Oregon Early Learning and Kindergarten Guidelines, and OCDC's current Self-Assessment and Quality Improvement Plan (SAQIP) for 2023.

- Goal 1: Children will increase Self-Regulation skills and establish and maintain positive relationships.
- Goal 2: Children will expand expressive and receptive language skills. Dual Language learners will build home language skills while progressing in their English.
- Goal 3: Children will develop in their phonological awareness and skills.
- Goal 4: Children will develop their problem- solving skills.
- Goal 5: Children will develop their physical wellness.
- Goal 6: Children will demonstrate positive approaches to learning.
- Goal 7: Children and families will enhance the connection with local schools and community.
- Goal 8: Children will develop their Mental Health Wellness.

Under these broad agency school readiness goals, county specific objectives for children's learning are developed for each program.



Programs

Calendar Year Programs

Migrant, Seasonal / Early Head Start (MSHS/EHS)

Migrant and Seasonal Head Start and Early Head Start is a statewide federally funded program, that provides comprehensive child development services to children and families. Migrant and Seasonal Head Start serves children of migrant and seasonal farm workers. Early Head Start provides services to pregnant woman, and infants and toddlers ages 0 to 3.

Early Head Start Childcare (EHS CCP)

Early Head Start Childcare (EHS CCP) serves children who are 6 weeks to 3 years of age and is a federally funded program that provides comprehensive child development services and compliments the Migrant and Seasonal Head Start Services.

School Year Programs

Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home Visiting (MIECHV)

This program provides home visits and education for low-income families with infants or toddlers as well as pregnant women. The home visiting program helps connect families to resources they need to ensure their child's healthy development.

Early Head Start Childcare Partnerships (RX EHS CCP)

OCDC works with child care partners to provide Early Head Start Child Care Partnerships – where child care providers work with our team of specialists and experts to elevate the quality of their child care to meet Early Head Start standards. Children 0-3 years' old who are eligible for Early Head Start can attend these year-round, full day services designed to maximize their developmental potential.

Migrant Education (MEP)

The purpose of the Migrant Education Program is to ensure that migrant children fully benefit from the same free public education provided to other children. The MEP helps State and community agencies address the unique educational needs of migrant children to support their academic success. OCDC partners with Migrant Ed to deliver summer programs.

Oregon Prenatal to Kindergarten (OPK)

This program is split into two options. Oregon Prekindergarten (OPK) serves children of 3-4 years of age and their families. This is a State funded Head Start program that provides education and child development services, helping prepare young children for school. The Oregon Prenatal to Three (OPK-P3) option serves expectant families and children up to 3 years of age and their families in center and home-based options. A State funded Early Head Start program that provides families with complex social, economic, and health needs the support they need to ensure effective child development in the earliest years.

Preschool for All (PFA)

This center-based program is only offered in Multnomah County at the Anderson Center and serves 3-4 year old children. PFA operates part-year (on a school-year calendar schedule), Monday through Friday, and offers income-eligible residents of Multnomah County families a full-day program option for their children who are 3 to 4 years of age.

Preschool Promise (PSP)

Preschool Promise (PSP) offers free, high-quality preschool to Oregon families who are living at or below 200 percent of the Federal Poverty Level in Oregon. Serving children ages three and four, PSP is a publicly funded program and complements other early learning programs such as OPK. PSP expands access to culturally responsive early learning programs.

ODE Child Nutrition Program

USDA (US Department of Agriculture) provides nutritious meals and snacks to children and low-income families, through the Oregon Department of Education (ODE) Child Nutrition Programs.



A total of 505,325 meals and snacks were provided in OCDC centers in 2022.

A total of 623,620 meals and snacks were provided in OCDC centers in 2023.

OCDC sponsors the Family Day Care Home (FDCH) Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) providers in 12 counties for the meals served to children.

The FDCH CACFP program provided 829,122 total meals for a monthly average of 69,093 in 2022. This included breakfast, lunch, dinner, and a snack. In 2023, these numbers increased to 929,426 total meals for a monthly average of 77,452 meals and snacks.

Community Assessment Summary

In May of 2023, OCDC published the first update to the 2022 Community Assessment.

This Community Assessment tells the story of Oregon’s least served and most vulnerable families and children over the past few years by looking at the social indicators.

Although the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency expired on May 11, 2023, “Oregonians have lived through experiences in the last two years that will surely shape the future of our state for decades to come: economically, educationally, socially, geographically” (Oregon By the Numbers, 2021).

The three major events that impacted Oregon in 2020-2023 – the pandemic, the wildfires, and the extreme weather continue to be at the forefront of Oregon’s issues in 2023.

Additionally, staffing, while always an issue in early childhood education, has now hit crisis levels.

All Oregon counties still child-care deserts for infants/toddlers, with 86% of children in 2020 without access to a childcare slot and 68% of children ages 3-5 without access to a childcare slot.

Upon analysis of the data, the following stood out:



Significant number of households in **financial hardship**



Staffing issues continue to be a major issue. Childcare employment in March of 2023 is 5.7% below what it was in February of 2020.



Rent costs in Oregon remain exorbitant with the average rent on a 2-bedroom apartment increasing from \$1,307 per month in 2021 to \$1,438 per month in 2022.



Teen pregnancy rate for Hispanic/Latina/o/x remains almost triple the rate for whites.



For **Fair Market Rent**, where a household doesn't pay more than 30% of their income towards rent, household must earn \$57,515 annually in 2022, up from \$52,296 in 2021.



The number of **H-2A certifications skyrocketed** from 3,163 in 2021 to 10,009 in 2022.



The number of **children in foster care** in rural communities in Oregon is almost double than in urban areas.



Unemployment jumped from 4.2% in 2020 to 7.6% in 2022. However, the job growth number (not available for last year's CA) is stunning. In 2020, Oregon's job growth was 7.9 per 1,000 people. In 2020, that number decreased to -32.7!



As of 2019, only 66.4% of Oregon's children up-to-date on **well child visits** and only 71% were up-to-date on **immunizations**.



Climate, weather, and risk of fires (causing poor air quality) were a continuing issue, with numbers from 2021 showing that Oregon had 7 days of poor air quality, 17 days of extreme heat, an average of 3/10 for risk of wildfires, and the average intensity of drought being 280/500.

Children going into Kindergarten in Oregon could only recognize **7.7 out of the 26 letters of the alphabet**.



Food prices increased 8.3% between March of 2022 and May of 2023.

The findings/trends identified in the 2023 Community Assessment report and the recommendations for the program based on those findings stayed the same from 2022 Community Assessment and are listed below.¹



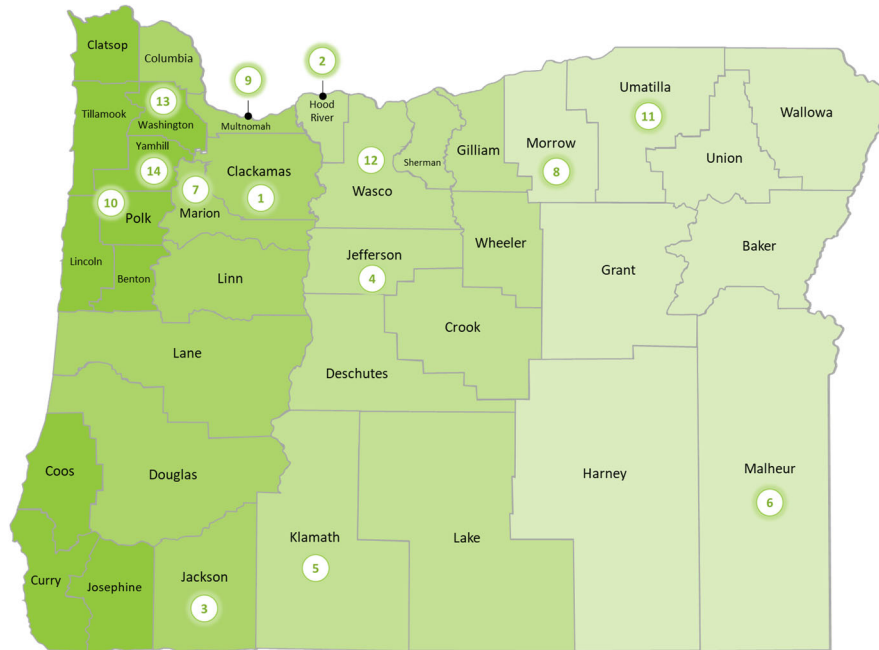

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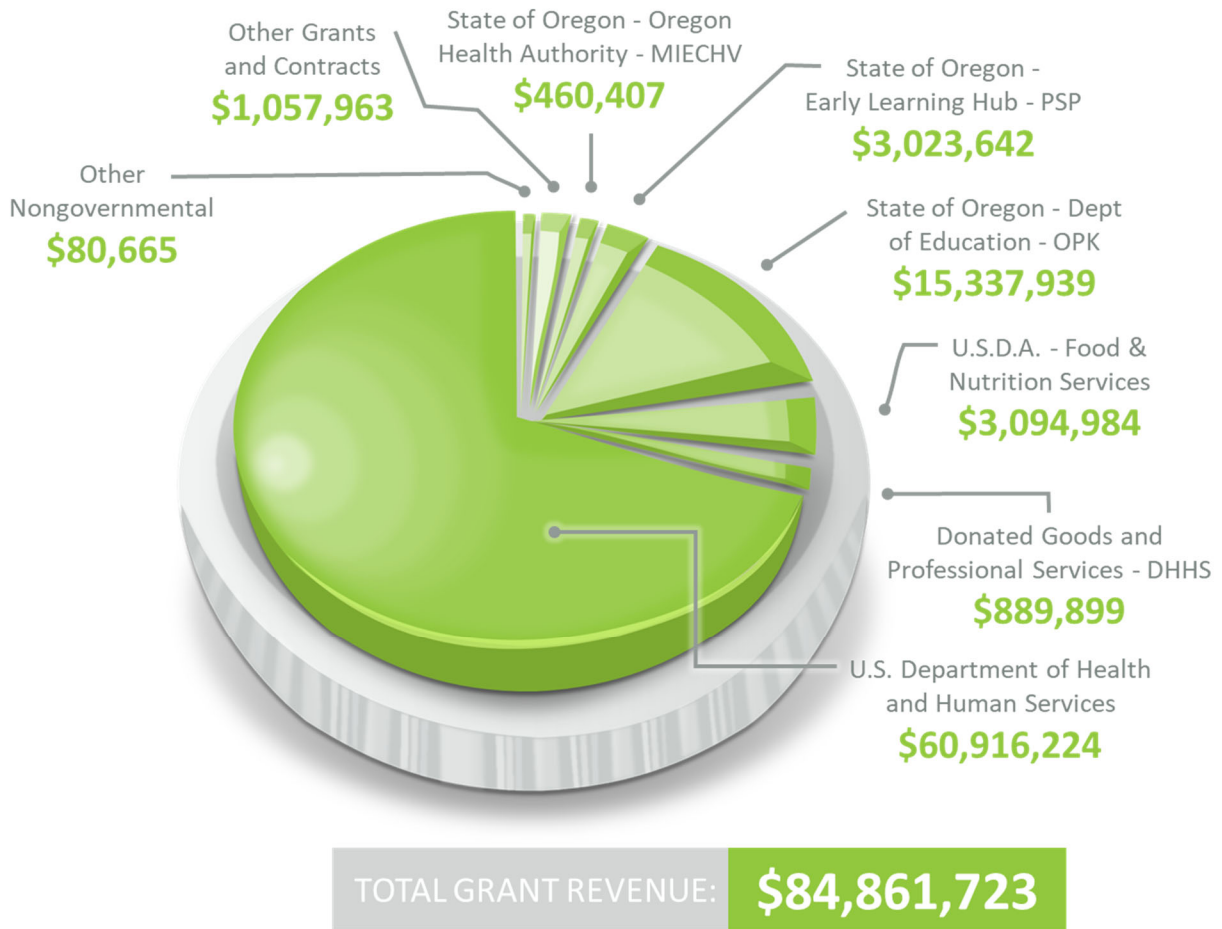

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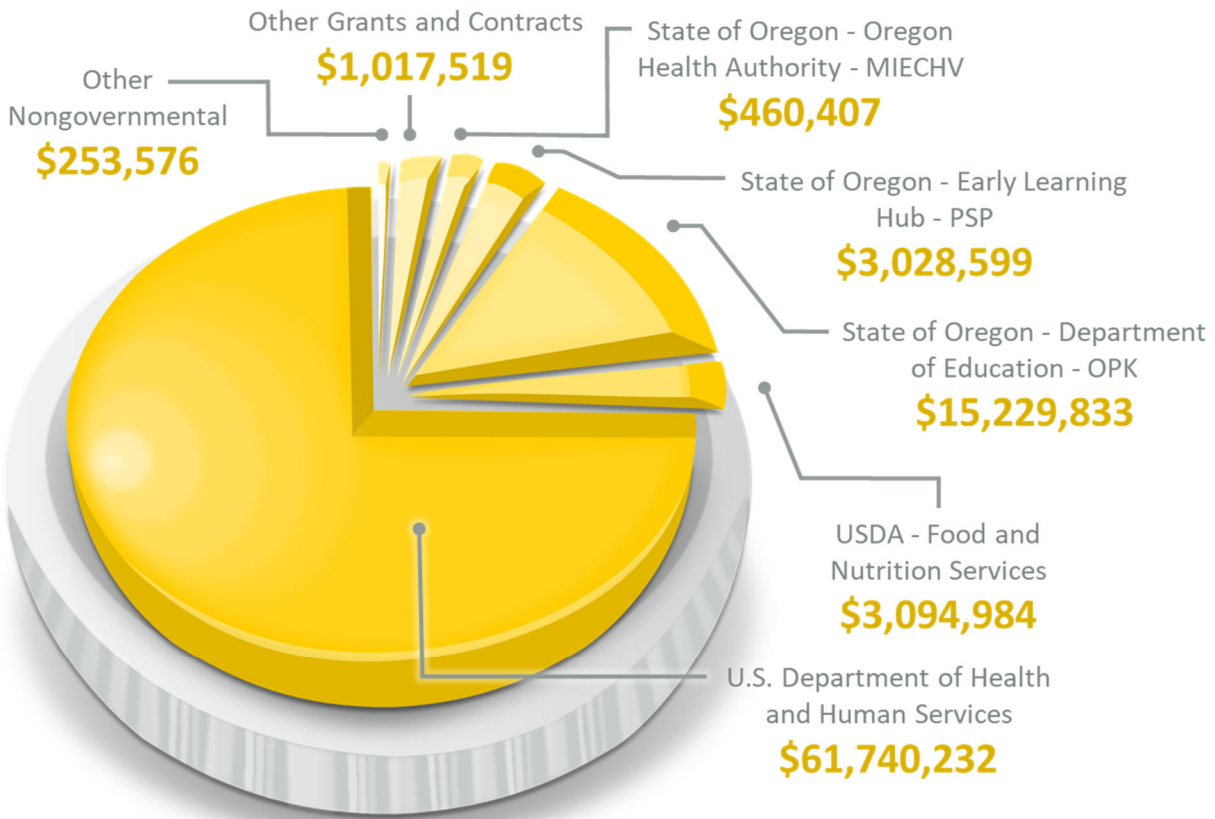
Budget, Revenue & Expenses 2023³

Kindergarten Readiness Data

Children, staff and family's social and emotional wellbeing and needs are/were the primary focus of School Readiness/Kindergarten Readiness. OCDC provides a variety of opportunities to support preparing children and families for the transition to kindergarten and ongoing school readiness. This includes transition activities to visit the local schools; Kindergarten Teachers visits to OCDC; family nights; Summer school with the public school; and classroom group and individual school readiness activities. Families are an integral partner in any part of the transition planning.

OCDC promotes the social and emotional well-being of children, families, and staff as the priority and primary focus of kindergarten and school readiness. This is promoted by the intensive implementation of the Pyramid Model framework, Second Step Curriculum, and the Early Childhood Mental Health Consultation model.

Agency Child Outcome Data is aggregated primarily, from the My Teaching Strategies online data system. OCDC teachers input observations that measure children's developmental progression, or growth, in seven domains of learning: Social and Emotional, Gross Motor, Fine Motor, Language, Cognitive, Literacy, and Math. Each domain of learning has objectives that teachers use to measure the progression of the children's development during the program year.

During 2022-2023 program year, the outcomes from the pandemic continued to affect OCDC in center services by classrooms periodically and unpredictably closing due to COVID-19 positive cases and exposures.

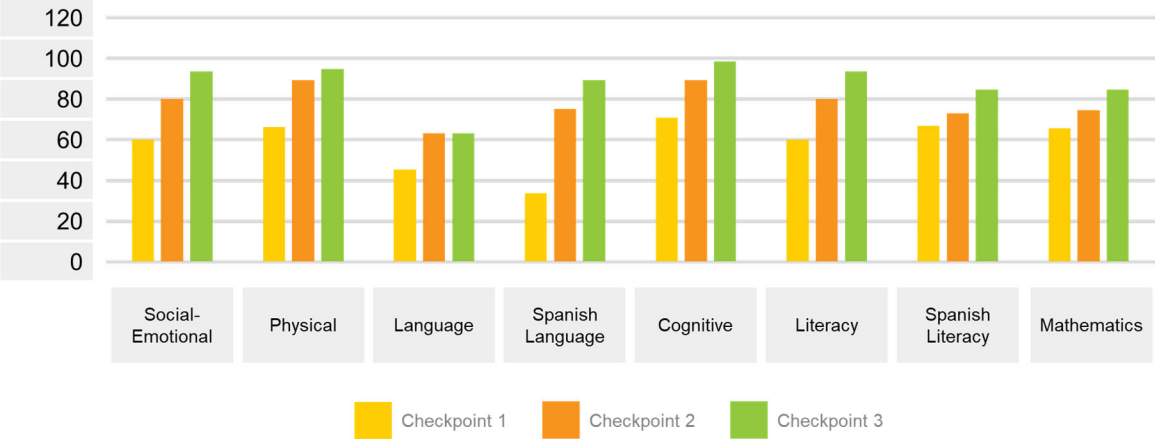
Children, Staff, and Family's Social and Emotional wellbeing are the primary focus of OCDC's School Readiness. Additional impacts to take in consideration include:

- When children started and stopped services due to positive COVID Tests and Staff Absences
- Staff Attrition
- Staff Capacity
- The increase in children receiving IFSP support and services
- The increase in children entering into the foster care system

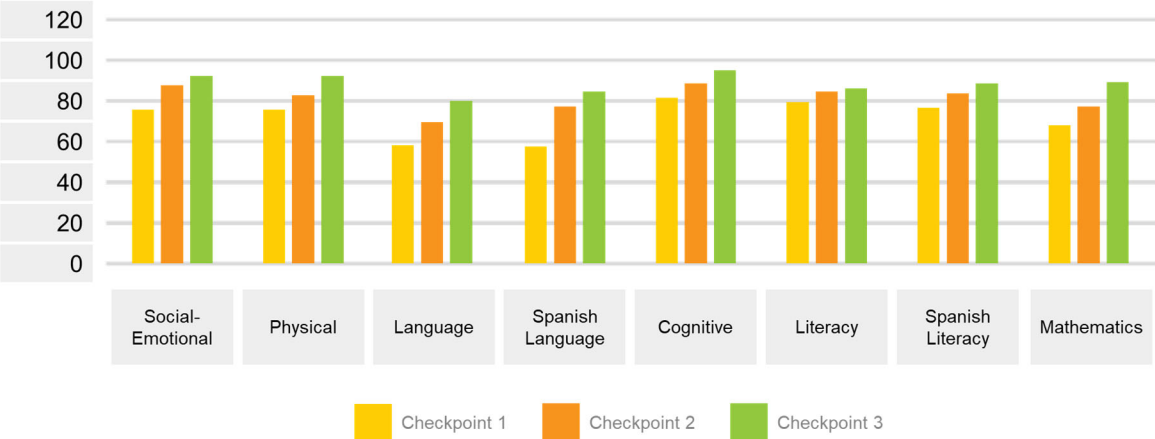
1. EHS CCP: The visualizations indicated there were consistent progression of all domains of learning across the first two checkpoints. Social-Emotional; Physical; Spanish Language; Spanish Literacy; and Mathematics saw an increase in the third checkpoint. Language and Literacy maintained their gains from the first two checkpoints.

2. 2022-2023 EHS Infant/Toddler Checkpoints: % of Children Meeting or Exceeding Expectations

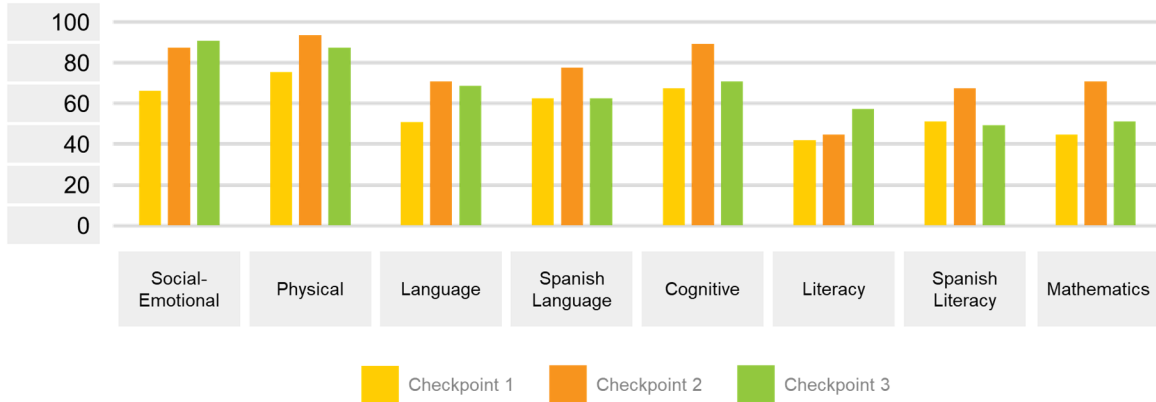


- Migrant and Seasonal Program: The visualizations indicated there was consistent progression across the first two check points in all domains. The third check point had progression in Social-Emotional and Literacy. The remaining domains, Physical; Language; Spanish Language; Cognitive; Spanish Literacy; and Mathematics saw decline.

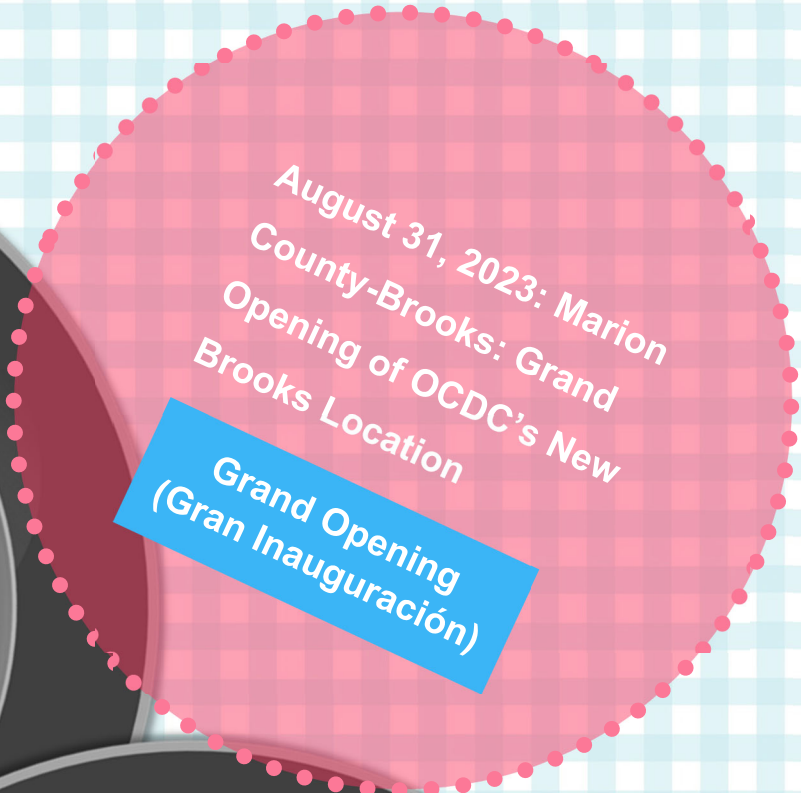
